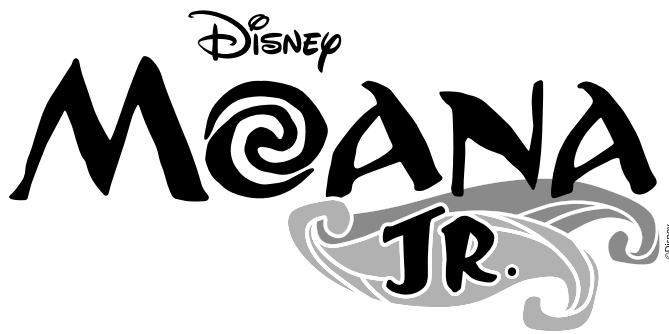

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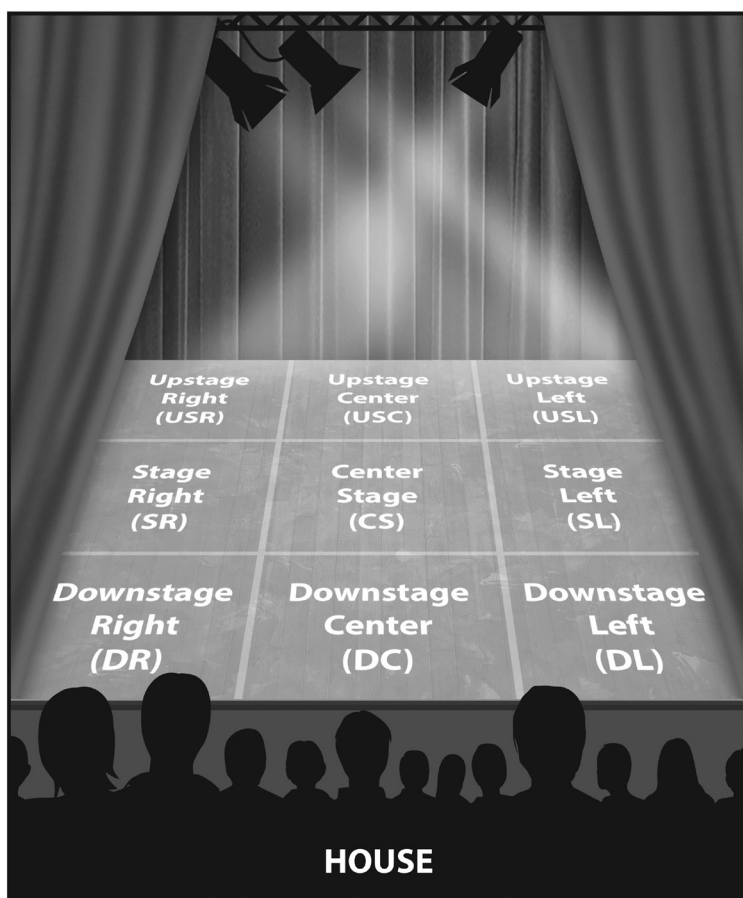
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WELCOME TO THE THEATER

Congratulations! You'll be working with your **creative team** and fellow **cast** members to put on a **musical**. Before you begin **rehearsals**, there are some important things you should know. This book is your **script**. Whether putting on a school production or rehearsing a professional show, every **actor**, **director**, and **stage manager** works from a script. Your Actor's Script contains additional information for this musical, like this introduction and two glossaries. You can look up any bold words in the Actor's Glossary at the back of this book. Be sure to take good care of your script and take notes with a pencil since what you'll be doing onstage can change during rehearsals.

One of the first things you'll need to learn is what to call the various areas of the stage. Since most stages used to be **raked**, or tilted down toward the **house** where the audience sits, the term **downstage** is still used to refer to the area closest to the audience, and **upstage** is used to refer to the area farthest from the audience. **Stage left** and **stage right** are from the actor's perspective when facing the audience. This diagram shows how to use these terms to label nine different parts of the stage.



WHAT TO EXPECT DURING REHEARSALS

You will be performing a musical, a type of **play** that tells a story through music, **choreography**, and **dialogue**. Because there are so many parts of a musical, most shows have more than one **author**. The **composer** writes the music and usually works with a **lyricist**, who writes the **lyrics**, or words, for the songs. The **book writer** writes the dialogue (spoken words, or **lines**) and the **stage directions**, which tell the actors what to do onstage and which music cues to listen for. If the book writer and lyricist are the same person, she is often referred to as the **librettist**, since the book and lyrics together are referred to as the **libretto**.

Your director will plan rehearsals so that the cast is ready to give its best performance on **opening night!** Remember to warm up before each rehearsal so that your mind, body, and voice are ready to go. Every rehearsal process is a little bit different, but here is an idea of what you can expect as you begin to work on your show:

Music

Since you're performing a musical, it is important to learn the music during the rehearsal process. Your **music director** will teach the cast all the songs in the show and tell you what to practice at home.

Choreography

Since most musicals include some movement or dance, you'll also be rehearsing choreography. Your **choreographer** will create the dances and teach them to the cast. The music and the choreography help tell the story.

Blocking & Scene Work

Your director will determine where everyone in the cast stands and how they move around the stage. You'll use theater **blocking** terms (downstage left, upstage right, etc.) a lot during this portion of the rehearsal process. You will also practice speaking your lines and work on memorizing them. Rehearsing your part from memory is called being **off-book**. Your director will help you understand the important action in each scene so you can make the best choices for your character's **objective**, or what your character wants.

MARKING YOUR SCRIPT

Notating your script can help you to remember important blocking and direction. Below are some tips to keep you on track.

1 Always write your name legibly on your script. Scripts have a way of getting lost or changing hands during rehearsals.

2 Mark your lines and lyrics with a bright-colored highlighter to make your part stand out on the page. This will allow you to look up from your script during rehearsals, since it will be easier to find your place when you look back down.

3 Underline important stage directions, lines, lyrics, and individual words. For example, if your director wants you to stress a word, underline it in your script.

4 Save time and space by using the following standard abbreviations:

ON: onstage	OFF: offstage	US: upstage
DS: downstage	SL: stage left	SR: stage right
CS: center stage	X: cross	

You may use these abbreviations to modify other instructions (you could write “R hand up” to remind yourself to raise your right hand). You may also combine them in various ways (you could write “XDSR” to remind yourself to cross downstage right).

5 Draw diagrams to help clarify your blocking. For example, if you are instructed to walk in a circle around a bench, you might draw a box to represent the bench, then draw a circle around it with an arrow indicating the direction in which you are supposed to walk.

6 Draw stick figures to help you remember your choreography.

7 Mark your music with large commas to remind yourself where to take breaths while singing.

8 Although you should feel free to mark up your script, be careful it doesn’t become so cluttered with notes that you have a hard time finding your lines on the page!

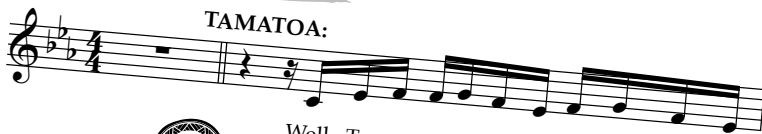

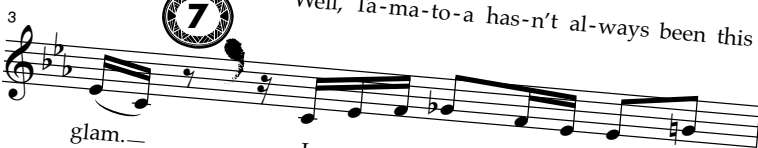

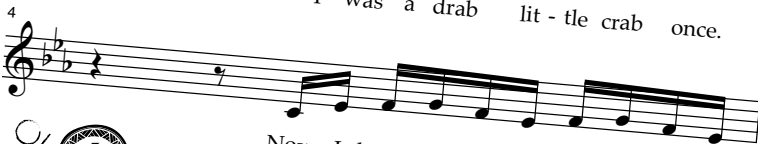

SYNOPSIS

The **CHIEF ANCESTORS** of Motunui and the **ANCESTOR ENSEMBLE** recount the tale of how, over a thousand years ago, **MAUI**, a shapeshifter and demigod, stole the heart of the goddess **TE FITI**, the mother island (*In the Beginning...*). While trying to escape with the Heart, Maui was attacked by **TE KĀ**, a demon of earth and fire. In their struggle, the Heart was lost to the sea. Fearing Te Kā's violent wrath, the **VILLAGERS** of Motunui stopped voyaging, a defeated Maui disappeared, and the **OCEAN** guarded the Heart of Te Fiti.

In the present, the Ocean entrusts the Heart to **MOANA** on the island of Motunui (*Tulou Tagaloa*). Despite Moana's strong connection to the Ocean, her parents, **CHIEF TUI** and **SINA**, view it as dangerous and prevent her from venturing out beyond the reef. They advise Moana to embrace her future role as the chief of the village, and the other Villagers join in to encourage Moana to find happiness on the island (*Where You Are – Parts 1 and 2*).

When the Villagers lament their blackened crops and the shortage of fish, Moana suggests fishing beyond the reef, but her father forbids it. Moana contemplates breaking the rules and voyaging out to sea (*How Far I'll Go*). Her friends, **PUA** and **HEI HEI**, try to stop her, but she remains steadfast. Together, the three push out to sea, but a large wave quickly capsizes their canoe.

GRAMMA TALA sees this failed expedition and decides to reveal the truth of their ancestors' voyaging past to Moana (*We Know the Way*). Soon, Gramma Tala grows weak, and in her last moments, urges Moana to draw courage from her inner voice, revealing that it is her destiny to return the Heart of Te Fiti (*Where You Are – Reprise*). After Gramma Tala's passing, an emboldened Moana resolves to fulfill her destiny and save Motunui (*How Far I'll Go – Reprise*).

Moana lands on an island and meets the arrogant, yet charming, Maui (*You're Welcome*). She convinces him to help her restore the Heart of Te Fiti. However, Maui insists that they first find his magical fishhook, which allows him to shapeshift. To do this, they journey into Lalotai, the Realm of Monsters (*Warrior Face – Parts 1-3*). Here, they find **TAMATOA**, the giant, egotistical crab who collects valuable objects – including Maui's hook.

In Tamatoa's lair, Moana acts as a distraction while Maui finds his hook (*Shiny – Parts 1 and 2*). Maui tries to shapeshift and save them both from Tamatoa's clutches, but he fails to harness the hook's powers. To escape, Moana cleverly tricks Tamatoa into pursuing a piece of glowing algae that resembles the Heart of Te Fiti (*Shiny – Playoff*).

Distraught over his failure to shapeshift, Maui loses confidence, but the ever-resilient Moana refuses to give up (**Warrior Face – Reprise / Logo Te Pate**). A revitalized Maui then agrees to teach Moana the ancient skills of wayfinding to help them in their mission.

As Moana and Maui finally approach Te Kā, they are met by treacherous seas. When Moana refuses to back down, a powerful wave cracks Maui's hook. Wanting to avoid permanent damage to the hook, Maui leaves Moana to finish the quest alone. Gramma Tala appears and reminds Moana of who she is and where she comes from (**Song of the Ancestors**).

With her confidence restored, Moana finally faces Te Kā. Maui returns to help, but Te Kā destroys his hook. Listening to her inner voice, Moana suddenly has a realization about Te Kā and lets the monster approach. Face to face with Te Kā, Moana places the Heart into Te Kā's chest (**Know Who You Are**). Te Kā transforms into the goddess Te Fiti and restores Maui's hook (**Te Fiti Restored / Tulou Tagaloa – Reprise**).

Moana returns home to a revived Motunui. Once more, the Villagers of Motunui assume their identity as voyagers, now with Moana as their master wayfinder (**We Know the Way – Finale**).

CHARACTERS

(in order of appearance)

ENSEMBLE – includes **ANCESTOR ENSEMBLE**, the ancient people of Motunui; **OCEAN ENSEMBLE**, a personification of the ocean and friend to Moana; **VILLAGERS** of Motunui, including **DANCERS**, **WEAVERS**, and **FISHERS**; **MAUI ENSEMBLE**, conjured fans of the demigod, always ready to sing Maui’s praises; **MONSTERS** of Lalotai, including a **GATE MONSTER**; and **SHINY ENSEMBLE**, Tamatoa’s glorious accomplices

CHIEF ANCESTORS (1-3) – three ancient chiefs of Moana’s family line who share the tales of their past with their people

MOANA – a strong, confident young woman and the future Chief of Motunui who is deeply connected to her island as well as the ocean and is curious about what lies beyond the reef; empowered and driven, Moana will stop at nothing to save her people

CHIEF TUI – Moana’s father and leader of Motunui who is protective of his daughter and his people, always wanting to keep them safe

SINA – Moana’s kind and loving mother who takes great pride in her daughter

PUA – one of Moana’s best friends, who is sweet and unconditionally loyal, even if easily scared

HEI HEI – Moana’s other best friend, who is well-meaning but not so bright

GRAMMA TALA – the wise and eccentric grandmother of Moana and mother of Chief Tui; she holds her role as Motunui’s storyteller with pride, passing on the stories of the island’s past

MAUI – the comedic, selfish, and sarcastic demigod of the wind and sea, who actually has a heart of gold

TAMATOA – a gigantic crab and collector of all things “shiny,” who is dangerously egotistical and dramatic

LEFT CLAW and **RIGHT CLAW** – Tamatoa’s crony-like claws who act as extensions of the crab’s self-centered and ostentatious nature

TE FITI – the regal and benevolent mother island, creator of all life; without her heart she appears as **TE KĀ**, a demon of earth and fire

THEATER TIPS

- It takes an ensemble to make a show; everyone's part is important.
- Be respectful of others at all times.
- Bring your script and a pencil to every rehearsal.
- Arrive at rehearsal on time and ready to begin.
- Be specific! Make clear choices about your character's background and motivation for each line and action.
- To help memorize your lines, write them down or speak them aloud to yourself in a mirror.
- Don't upstage yourself. **Cheat out** so the audience can always see your face and hear your voice.
- Before each performance, tell everyone to "break a leg" – which is theater talk for "good luck"!
- Be quiet backstage and remember: if you can see the audience, they can see you – so stay out of sight.
- If you forget a line or something unexpected happens onstage, keep going! When you remain confident and in character, it's unlikely that the audience will notice anything is wrong.
- Remember to thank your director and fellow cast and crew.
- **Have fun!**

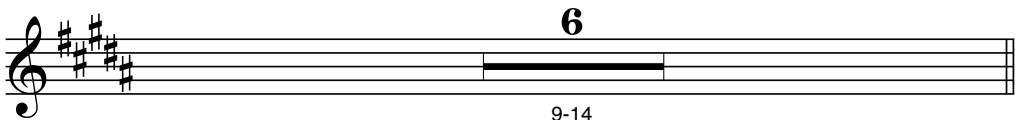

CHIEF ANCESTOR 3: The world was theirs to discover.



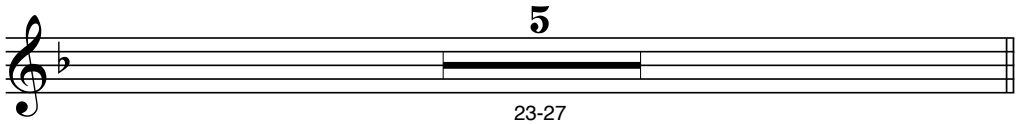

I'm his mom, I don't have to tell him anything.

MOANA

He's right. It's time to keep my feet on the ground and stay in the village.

GRAMMA TALA

If that's what you want... go on then.

MOANA

(suspicious)

Why are you acting weird?

GRAMMA TALA

I'm the village crazy lady. That's my job.

MOANA

If there's something you want to tell me, just tell me.

GRAMMA TALA

Moana, you've been told all our people's stories... but one.

(#9 – WE KNOW THE WAY. Illustrating Gramma's story, CHIEF ANCESTORS 1 and 2 enter onboard a canoe.)

SCENE 6: CANOE AT SEA

(#15 – YOU'RE WELCOME – PLAYOFF. MAUI ENSEMBLE exits as MAUI begins to sail off, leaving MOANA on the island.)

MAUI

Goodbye! Thank you! You've been great. No, no really, best audience I've had in a thousand years! Terrific! Smell you later!

MOANA

Hey! You can't leave me here!

(turns to OCEAN ENSEMBLE)

Uh... Ocean? A little help?

(#16 – A LITTLE HELP. OCEAN ENSEMBLE carries MOANA to the canoe.)

MAUI

What the heck?

MOANA

The ocean is a friend of mine.

(MOANA crosses her arms triumphantly.)

MAUI

Look, little girl – and the ocean – there's no way I'm going to Te Fiti. I need to get my hook!

MOANA

Your hook?

MAUI

Um. Yes. I wasn't exactly hanging out on that island for fun. When Te Kā and I fought, I lost my hook and got trapped there.

MOANA

I am Moana of Motunui. This is my canoe and I am going to get us to Te Fiti, so you can put it back. Thank you.

(mocking MAUI)

"YOU'RE WELCOME."

(MOANA holds out the Heart to MAUI.)

MAUI

You got a little too much salt water in your ears? Without my hook, I can't shapeshift, and I certainly can't take on Te Kā.

*(MAUI grabs the Heart and throws it out far. #17 – **A LITTLE MORE HELP.** OCEAN ENSEMBLE catches the Heart and puts it back in MOANA’s outstretched hand.)*

MAUI

All right, I’m out. I’m swimming back to the island. Maybe in another thousand years, someone else will come who’s a little less...

(MAUI gestures with frustration to all of MOANA.)

MOANA

What’s your problem?!? Are... you afraid? You’re afraid of the Heart, aren’t you?

(MOANA clucks like a chicken, teasing MAUI.)

MAUI

That is not a heart, it is a curse. Get it away from me.

MOANA

(teasing, holding it closer)

Get this away?

MAUI

Stop that. I will smite you. You wanna get smote?

(MOANA and MAUI both make a confused face.)

MOANA

“Smote”?

MAUI

Smoten?

MOANA

(“that’s definitely not a word”)

“Smoten”?

MAUI

Ugh. Listen, that thing doesn’t give you power to create life. It’s a homing beacon of death. I am not going on mission impossible with some “mortal.” End of discussion.

MOANA

You’d be a hero.

(#18 – YOU’D BE A HERO.)

(MOANA)

That's what you're all about, right?

MAUI

I am a hero.

MOANA

Maybe you were... but now you're just the guy who stole the Heart of Te Fiti... the guy who cursed the world. You're no one's hero.

MAUI

No one?

MOANA

But, return the Heart, save the world? You'd be everyone's hero.

(like a stadium roar)

Maui! Maui! Maui! You're so amazing.

MAUI

(momentarily enjoys the pep talk, then:)

Ugh. Fine.

MOANA

Really?

MAUI

First, we get my hook.

MOANA

Then save the world. Deal?

MAUI

Deal.

(#19 – WARRIOR FACE – PART 1. MOANA and MAUI shake hands.)

WARRIOR FACE (PART 1)

(MAUI): We go find Tamatoa. If anyone has my hook it's that greedy giant crab.

MOANA: Giant... crab? Is it... dangerous?

MAUI: Tamatoa is one of the fiercest creatures around.

(imitates a cheering crowd, just as MOANA did before)

ACTOR'S GLOSSARY

- actor:** A person who performs as a character in a play or musical.
- antagonist:** A person who actively opposes the protagonist.
- author:** A writer of a play; also known as a playwright. A musical's authors include a book writer, a composer, and a lyricist.
- blocking:** The actors' movements around the stage in a play or musical, not including the choreography. The director usually "blocks" the show (or assigns blocking) during rehearsals.
- book writer:** One of the authors of a musical. The book writer writes the lines of dialogue and the stage directions. A book writer can be called a librettist if she writes the lyrics as well.
- cast:** The performers in a show.
- cheating out:** Turning slightly toward the house when performing so the audience can better see one's face and hear one's lines.
- choreographer:** A person who creates and teaches the dance numbers in a musical.
- choreography:** The dances in a musical that are often used to help tell the story.
- composer:** A person who writes music for a musical.
- creative team:** The director, choreographer, music director, and designers working on a production. The original creative team for a musical also includes the author(s) and orchestrator.
- cross:** An actor's movement to a new position onstage.
- dialogue:** A conversation between two or more characters.
- director:** A person who provides the artistic vision, coordinates the creative elements, and stages the play.
- downstage:** The portion of the stage closest to the audience; the opposite of upstage.
- house:** The area of the theater where the audience sits to watch the show.
- house left:** The left side of the theater from the audience's perspective.
- house right:** The right side of the theater from the audience's perspective.
- librettist:** The person who writes both dialogue and lyrics for a musical. Can also be referred to separately as the book writer and lyricist.
- libretto:** A term referring to the script (dialogue and stage directions) and lyrics together.
- lines:** The dialogue spoken by the actors.

lyricist: A person who writes the lyrics, or sung words, of a musical. The lyricist works with a composer to create songs.

lyrics: The words of a song.

monologue: A large block of lines spoken by a single character.

music director: A person in charge of teaching the songs to the cast and orchestra and maintaining the quality of the performed score. The music director may also conduct a live orchestra during performances.

musical: A play that incorporates music and choreography to tell a story.

objective: What a character wants to do or achieve.

off-book: An actor's ability to perform memorized lines without holding the script.

offstage: Any area out of view of the audience; also called backstage.

onstage: Anything on the stage within view of the audience.

opening night: The first official performance of a production, after which the show is frozen, meaning no further changes are made.

play: A type of dramatic writing meant to be performed live on a stage. A musical is one kind of play.

protagonist: The main character of a story on which the action is centered.

raked stage: A stage that is raised slightly upstage so that it slants toward the audience.

read-through: An early rehearsal of a play at which actors read their dialogue from scripts without blocking or memorized lines.

rehearsal: A meeting during which the cast learns and practices the show.

score: All musical elements of a show, including songs and underscoring.

script: 1) The written words that make up a show, including dialogue, stage directions, and lyrics. 2) The book that contains those words.

speed-through: To perform the dialogue of a scene as quickly as possible. A speed-through rehearsal helps actors memorize their lines and infuses energy into the pacing of a scene.

stage directions: Words in the script that describe character actions that are not part of the dialogue.

stage left: The left side of the stage, from the actor's perspective.

stage manager: A person responsible for keeping all rehearsals and performances organized and on schedule.

stage right: The right side of the stage, from the actor's perspective.

upstage: The part of the stage farthest from the audience; the opposite of downstage.

warm-ups: Exercises at the beginning of a rehearsal or before a performance that prepare actors' voices and bodies.

SHOW GLOSSARY

algae: Living organisms commonly found in water (like seaweed), that create much of the earth's oxygen; often look like plants.

alienated: Alone or separated.

bared: Shown or revealed.

bioluminescent: Describing an organism that gives off light, making it glow (e.g., fireflies).

blow: A sudden attack or strike in a battle or fight.

breakaway: A play in sports such as basketball or hockey in which a player breaks free from the opposing team to score a goal.

capsize: To flip over.

cluster: To group together.

crustacean: An aquatic animal that has a hard shell, such as a crab or lobster.

decapod: A crustacean with five pairs of legs, such as a crab or lobster.

demigod: A being who is half god and half human.

deserted: Left alone.

devoured: Eaten or swallowed up.

diversion: A distraction.

doldrums: An equatorial region of the ocean with light winds and calm ocean currents.

feats: Great achievements.

forbade: Commanded not to do something.

harnessed: Gained control over something's powers.

homing: Guiding home.

hongi: A traditional Māori greeting in which foreheads are pressed together in a demonstration of pure compassion.

lagoon: An area of shallow water that is separated from the ocean.

lair: A hideaway.

lassoed: Caught with a long rope.

legends: Ancient stories passed down by generations among a particular group of people.

minnow: A small fish.

mischievous: Playfully troublesome.

mortals: Beings that do not live forever.

navigator: A person who explores the sea.

overturning: Flipping over.

phenomenon: An event that is observed.

reef: A ridge of rocks, sand, or coral near the surface of the water.

restore: To bring back to a former place or position.

scoff: A mocking expression of scorn.

shapeshifter: A being that can change shapes and assume forms of other beings.

smite: To strike down. Past tense: smote.

taro root: A starchy root vegetable that is an important food item in the Pacific Islands.

teeming: Swarming with something.

voyagers: A group of people who explore the seas.

wayfinding: The practice of navigating using observations of the environment.

OCEANIC LANGUAGES GUIDE

The score of *Moana JR.* includes lyrics in two Oceanic languages: Samoan, the language of Samoa, and Tokelauan, the language of Tokelau. Below are the guiding principles for singing in these two Oceanic languages, followed by a chart that outlines the pronunciations and meanings of these lyrics.

Combinations of vowels, or diphthongs, are common, like AU, AO, EA, OI, UA.

The Letter “G”

The letter “g” is a nasal consonant, rolled together with the letter “n” to make the sound “ng.” These Oceanic languages do not have a hard “g” sound, like in the English word “hug.” This “ng” is like the one heard in “song” or “singer,” but not the one heard in “finger,” which retains the hard “g” sound. For example, the Samoan word “*tagata*” is pronounced “tah-ngah-tah” rather than “tah-gah-tah” or “tahn-gah-tah.”

The Glottal Stop

Noted in the lyric with an apostrophe, the glottal stop creates a short pause between two vowels, separating the two sounds. It is important that you be conscious of the glottal stop, as removing or adding one can change the meaning of the word. For example, the Samoan word “*Vala’auina*” is pronounced “vah-lah-ah-oo-ee-nah” rather than “vah-lau-ee-nah.”
